## The Welsh Revenue Authority



The Welsh Revenue Authority (WRA) is a new public body responsible for collecting devolved Welsh taxes from 2018.

In 2018 the WRA will collect £288m\* of taxes in Wales

## Top Facts

- First tax institution to be established for Wales
- The Board has been appointed, including the Chair Designate Kathryn Bishop
- The WRA headquarters will be based in Treforest. It will have a presence in mid and north Wales
- WG will announce rates and bands in October 2017
- Registration will be open in early 2017, collecting taxes from 2018.

# Bigger Picture

- New welsh fiscal powers mean Welsh Ministers will be responsible for c25-30% of Welsh Government budget
- WRA created specifically to support Welsh Government in the delivery of Welsh taxes:
  - landfill disposals tax
  - land transaction tax
- New institution will develop expertise in Welsh taxes and work alongside other tax institutions (local authorities and HMRC to support Welsh Government's tax agenda)
- WRA will be a 'digital native' organisation

## What will the WRA do?

#### The WRA will:

- Provide information, advice and assistance about the taxes to taxpayers
- Support taxpayers in complying with their duties
- Use data to assess risk and check the right amount of tax is paid
- Tackle tax avoidance and evasion
- Resolve complaints and disputes
- Support the development of Welsh Government tax policy

# WRA Compliance Strategy

- Compliance is about everything WRA will do
- Enabling customers to get it right first time
- Core principles the three 'Cs'
  - > Cooperate Maximising voluntary compliance
  - Check Detecting non-compliance early
  - Challenge Pursue non-compliance and enforce the devolved taxes
- Emphasis on understanding and supporting our customers
- Partnership working is key

## What next?

- Recruitment!
- User testing
- Ongoing collaboration with HMRC to transition between the taxes
- Staff move to WRA Headquarters in autumn 2017
- WRA established in October 2017, open for registration in early 2017, and collecting taxes in April 2018
